MEETINGS

The LSCSG met on four occasions in 2022, 25 January, 21 April, 28 July & 24 November. The LSCSG Sub-Group tasked with organising a Logistics and Supply Chain Skills Week also met on 8 occasions during 2022.

OBJECTIVES OF THE GROUP



Provide a forum for ongoing communication, collaboration and leadership by the Logistics and Supply Chain sectors in addressing the skills needs of the sector in Ireland.





Monitor labour market developments in the Logistics and Supply Chain sector and provide insights into their emerging skills needs.





Improve the profile of Logistics/Supply Chain roles, making it easier to recruit talent including by improving knowledge among secondary students of the range of interesting roles across all sectors.





Make progression pathways available to those entering or already working in the roles, particularly for those at lower skilled levels, with clear role definitions mapped to academic or other vocational awards.

The Group agreed that this Skills Week would be held from 27 March to 1 April 2023 and would be launched in Rosslare Europort by Minister of State Jack Chambers.

Ireland's Road Haulage Strategy 2022-2031 was published on 15 December 2022.

It sets out the strategic policy direction for the haulage and road freight industry over the next ten years.

Gender % of persons employed in transportation and storage Q4 2022


