	The immediate priority for the July jobs initiative identified are:				
G	General (economy wide) measures				

 The tourism sector in particular would benefit from extending TWSS for a further period; 	
2. The zero interest rate for "warehousing" of taxes to be extended beyond 12 months to 24 months for the tourism sector in recognition of the expected slow rate of recovery of international travel and the seasonality of much of the sector;	
 Waiver of commercial rates to be extended (i) from 3 months to 12 months and (ii) to apply to all tourism businesses including those who remained open; 	
Tourism sector specific measures	
 A grant aid fund of €80m (current) to save vulnerable but viable businesses; 	
 A grant aid fund of €36m (capital) for Covid-19 related capital expenditure designed to facilitate businesses remaining open or re- opening; 	
 €32m investment in air access restoration and international marketing of Ireland now that the recovery is underway; 	
 A temporary and targeted reduction in the 13.5% VAT rate would sharpen our competitiveness; 	
Other possible Tourism specific measures	
8. Tax incentives such as a reduction in employer PRSI to incentivise staff in intensive sectors such as hospitality – perhaps as a bridge for a period of 2 years between the ending or phasing out of TWSS and full return of staff to employer payroll;	
9. Expansion of the €500 tax free bonus	

	scheme available to employers for their employees. Suggestion is that the amount be increased to €1,000 with the requirement that the voucher be redeemed for domestic accommodation with perhaps additional top-up incentives being provided by industry. 10. October mid term being split over two weeks depending on region.	
	Members view the existing supports available from DBEI as not suitable for the majority of Tourism businesses and the requirement is for more targeted supports to help the industry for the survival phase.	
	Clarity is required on mass gatherings and an opportunity to engage with public health officials would be welcomed in order to understand the limitations and requirements.	
2.	Orla Carroll, Director Product Development, Fáilte Ireland presented on Financial Scheme Submissions followed by Q&A.	Noted
	The draft initial report on survival phase recommendations was discussed in detail cognisant of the immediate priorities and the Financial Scheme Submissions and the following was noted:	
	The urgency in getting adaptation grants to businesses now so that they can re-open.	
	The requirement to speed up the process as items highlighted have been highlighted all along and the requirement now is for a commitment.	
	It was agreed that the initial report to the Minister will be for the immediate, absolute urgent interventions required between now and the end of the year.	
	The need to be cognisant that there is only one limited pot with a lot of industries competing for it and review our recommendations for the short, medium and long term in light of this.	
	The 14 day quarantine is the most urgent item facing tourism and the need to remove this which aligns with the Aviation taskforce.	
	October mid-term split out over two weeks would make a real difference to businesses and might be more palatable than delaying back to school for this	

	year.	
	 Messaging needs to be clear and concise in report. 	
	 Messaging needs to be clear and directly from the 	
	Government, ideally the Taoiseach to encourage the public to go on staycations.	
	Staycation vouchers merits and downfalls were discussed. Look at possibility of linking destinations for staycations to the safety charter by Fáilte Ireland.	
	Requirement is for hospitality and tourism targeted supports as they are intertwined.	
	Media support in promoting Ireland for staycations.	
	In summary for the initial report there needs to be prioritization, urgency and presentation, need to position priorities, put a value/cost on proposals for the 1. Extension of wage subsidy schemes taking into account seasonal workers 2. Survival grant 3. Adaptation grant and 4. Working capital scheme.	
	Initial report needs to go to the Minister tomorrow Thursday 25/06/2020. The chair and secretariat will revise report based on feedback and send back out to all members today/tomorrow.

	The Chair advised that work on-going in the work streams. Terms of reference circulated for the culture and heritage work stream and the tourism and competitiveness work stream and both work streams have had initial meetings.	
3.1	<i>Consultation</i> work stream. The questionnaire went live last Friday evening and as of yesterday had over 550 submissions. Due to close this weekend. A report will issue of the findings in the following week. Representative groups and other key tourism businesses are submitting proposals that are uploaded to the questionnaire that need to be reviewed also.	Noted
	The chair suggested that the TRT will meet with 12 – 15 representative organisations and allow them 15-20 minutes to present their submissions.
