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# Input to Public Consultation on the Draft GPP Strategy and Action Plan

#### 17 November 2023

**Introduction:** Ambitious Green Public Procurement (GPP) policy has the potential to enable and influence a shift towards more sustainable consumption patterns within Irish society and our economy. Organic food procurement can make an important contribution as the only agroecological farming method based on a legally ensured guarantee system. Not only are public organic food and catering services implemented across Europe<sup>1</sup>, but it has been demonstrated to work in Ireland in the past.<sup>2</sup> We, therefore, welcome the recognition and commitment to organic food sourcing in the draft Strategy and Action Plan, which is in line with the goals of the EU Organic Action Plan.<sup>3</sup> Below the Irish Organic Association outline recommendations for the final Green Public Procurement Strategy and Action Plan.

Targets for Public Procurement of Organic Food: A minimum of 10% of food procured by public sector bodies to be certified organic from the 1st January 2024 (Target 2) is an important first step in the government's efforts to lead by example. However, this should be complemented by a more ambitious target of reaching up to 30% of organic food procured by the public sector by 2030. Such a target can help to set a clearer direction of travel in terms of the growth and development of Irish organic supply chains. Although organic production in Ireland is starting from a low base and some 'seasonal' organic produce may need to be imported in the short to medium term, there is strong potential for import substitution across a wide range of product lines in the medium to long term.

#### **Proposed New Target 2b**

Reach a minimum of 30% of certified organic food procured by public sector bodies by 2030.

Investing in Organic Public Procurement Capacity-Building: Targets alone are not enough to mainstream organic public procurement and capacity-building efforts need to address the specificities of organic food and catering services. For instance, investments in capacity-building are essential to increase public sector competencies in contract design that effectively procure a wide range of Irish organic produce, including an understanding of availability and seasonality; to empower catering companies/staff to prepare menus with organic ingredients and/or full meals with existing or adapted infrastructure and budgets; and to enable producers and distributors to meet quality requirements, continuity of supply of Irish organic produce and optimise regional distribution channels as organic operators can be widely dispersed. Practical guidance and training for all relevant food actors, complemented by regional pilots, can help to stimulate organic public procurement nationwide<sup>4</sup>.

### **Proposed New Action 24b**

Develop specialised practical guidance and training and regional pilots to foster practitioner capacities that support increased public procurement of certified Irish organic produce.
