i. Minister Doherty's Opening Remarks:

Minister Doherty welcomed and thanked the members of the group for agreeing to participate on the Labour Market Advisory Council (LMAC). Council membership brings together a strong blend of skills and relevant experience. Against the ongoing backdrop of the COVID-19 pandemic, the Council will play an important role over the coming weeks and months in shaping the policy response and programmes that are needed to support economic recovery. Given the urgency of the economic situation, the Minister requested that the Council meet frequently and publish a paper on options to assist the labour market and support economic recovery as quickly as possible.

ii. Chair's Introduction

The Chair thanked the Minister for her opening address and noted the urgency of the response that she has tasked the Council with. He welcomed all participants to the meeting before inviting everyone to introduce themselves briefly.

iii. Secretary General's Remarks:

John McKeon welcomed and thanked all participants for their attendance. The COVID-19 pandemic marks the largest, deepest and broadly spread labour market shock in modern times. The Irish

labour market has transitioned from almost full employment to unprecedented levels of temporary unemployment in just four weeks. The situation continues to evolve at a national level and the rate of getting workers back into employment and economic recovery is dependant on the easement of public health restrictions. It is imperative over the coming period to: maintain links between firms and their workers, address work incentive challenges and provide upskilling and retraining opportunities to displaced workers. This may include redeployment to other sectors.

iv. Terms of Reference

The Council adopted the Terms of Reference and agreed, in response to a suggestion from Ger Gibbons, to include a reference to UN Sustainable Development Goal No. 8 (Decent Work) in the opening paragraph.

v. Lobbying Regulations: Transparency Code

The Council agreed to operate under the Transparency Code. Minutes of meetings and publications emanating from the Council will be made publicly available on a Gov.ie landing page.

vi. Draft LMAC Working Paper 'The Initial Impact of the Covid-19 Pandemic on Ireland's Labour Market'

Work is ongoing by D/EASP officials in partnership with the Central Bank Ireland. The Chair recommended publication and invited comments on the latest working draft, via the Secretariat, no later than COB, Wednesday 29th April. Publication is expected guickly thereafter.

vii. Discussion Themes:

The Chair facilitated an extensive roundtable discussion on: short-time working supports and wage subsidies; targeting of supports by sector/region (supports & challenges).

Key discussion points:

- Continuing to assess the package and balance of household income and enterprise supports in tandem with the resumption of economic activity
- Assessing the impact of COVID-19 on different sectors and regions and the need for a differentiated approach having regard to likely speed with which sectors and regions can recover
- Observe Building on strong stakeholder relationships that exist at a national and local level
- Future of Work: Emergence of new sectors and innovative ways of working will continue to be an ongoing focus
- The requirement for upskilling and retraining opportunities to affected firms/workers and those who have been displaced as a result of the pandemic, including the use of innovative training platforms

- ✓ Active Labour Market Policies: the role of internships & contracted services
- ✓ The future of work & digital services delivery
