Performance Delivery Agreement 2023

1. Background and context

1.1 Objectives of this Agreement

The purpose of this Agreement is to define, in the context of the resource inputs provided, the targets by which the performance of the Office of the State Pathologist (OSP) will be measured in 2023. The ongoing supports that the Department of Justice will provide to the OSP in this regard, and the mechanisms for monitoring and appraising performance, form part of the overall governance arrangements between the two parties and as such are set out in the separate but complementary multiannual Oversight Agreement.

1.2 Inputs

1.2.1 Financial Inputs

The OSP's budget allocation for 2023 is as follows:

2.3 Main risks to achievement of targets

The main potential risks to achievement of the targets set out in this Agreement, and the corresponding mitigation measures in place, are as follows:
